English Activities:

Investigate a sea animal and write an information leaflet about it.




- Create your own sea animal and describe it showing how it is different to other animals.
- Write your own story about a sea animal travelling across the ocean.
- Go to the local library and find some books about sea creatures and habitats. You could also find some pirate stories!
- Compare different sea animals and write down how they are different to each other.
 You could put this in a quiz!



 Create a calligram poem in the shape of a sea animal.

Maths Activities:

- Ask your friends or family about their favourite sea animal. Record your findings by showing it in a tally chart, block graph or pictogram.
- Make your own pirate's treasure map. Write the directions to find the treasure – use language of straight line, turns in terms of right angles, quarter, half and three-quarter turns (clockwise and anticlockwise)



- Make your own clock. Leave it around the house e.g. on the fridge and challenge your family and yourself to tell the time to the hour, half past, quarter to and quarter past, to 5 minutes.
- Time yourself to do some activities e.g. 10 star jumps, complete a simple puzzle. Can you do it again and beat your time?
- Log in to Mathletics and TT Rockstars and choose some games that challenge you.

Topic Activities:

- Research an ocean habitat Draw a detailed picture of what could be found in the habitat or create it out of junk modelling
- Make your own favourite/researched sea creature out of salt dough, in sand, or natural materials like leaves and twigs!
- Use an atlas or maps online, to locate different seas and what sea animals you most likely see there!
- Research any sea animals that have become extinct or are close to extinction.
- Try some meditation exercise outside in the sunshine. Focus on your breathing, listen to the sounds around you. How does it make you feel?
- Drop a hula hoop on a patch of grass and count how many plants and insects you find in it?
